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

### To Our Members, Donors and Friends,

 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}$ s President of AGBU, I have been privileged to observe the far- reaching life of our organization as few are able to do. Visiting Chapters and Schools in recent years around the world and communicating with our enthusiastic Chairpersons and Representatives, I have been overwhelmed time and time again by the dedication and spirit of our members, donors and staff. In this biennial report, you have the unique opportunity to see the world of AGBU as I do and appreciate our many accomplishments throughout the past two years. It is a world that AGBU founder and first President Boghos Nubar could never have envisioned as he set out a century ago to form an organization to serve all Armenians and preserve and perpetuate the Armenian identity. It is a community that has extended to six continents and touched so many lives in so many ways. Today, we continue to be proud of AGBU and all it stands for as we celebrate its milestone Centennial anniversary. As you read this report, I hope you gain inspiration from the tremendous positive force that defines AGBU.

With assets totaling \$272 million and an annual budget of \$36 million as of 2005, AGBU stands strong as the largest Armenian non-profit organization in the world. Providing a full spectrum of educational, cultural and humanitarian programs, AGBU remains active on the front-lines every day, reaching out to over 400,000 Armenians through a global network of 73 Districts and Chapters, 48 Community Centers and Offices, 13 Young Professional Groups, 33 Day and Saturday schools, Student Scholarships, Summer Camps, Athletics, Scouts & Youth Groups, Internship Programs, Performing Arts and 14 publications.

Transforming the donations and bequests entrusted to it for the benefit of the Armenian people, AGBU has been hard at work making lasting change all around the world. Renovations and expansions to centers in Buenos Aires and Montreal, schools in Canoga Park, Detroit and Montevideo, and Camp Nubar in New York served to reinforce our presence in these robust Armenian communities. With an eye on expansion in Europe, AGBU has also laid important groundwork by bolstering

our presence in France, the hub of the Armenian European community.

Our long-term investment in the diaspora is pivotal to the development and strengthening of our ties with Armenia, which has experienced substantial growth since its joyous declaration of independence 15 years ago. Paramount to the preservation of our national identity, AGBU has invested over \$100 million in the homeland since independence and almost \$15 million in the last two years on a range of educational, religious, cultural and humanitarian programs, including the Children's Centers, Soup Kitchens, special projects in Holy Etchmiadzin, the Ultrasound Center, and the Armenian Philharmonic Orchestra. Highlights include contributions to the expansion of the American University of Armenia with the addition and construction of two new buildings, and the announcement of our future plans to build an AGBU educational and cultural center in Armenia for diaspora youth to discover their origins with local peers.

Several projects over the last two years stand witness to AGBU's ongoing commitment to restoring the war-torn infrastructure of neighboring Karabakh, including the establishment of an AGBU office in the capital city of Stepanakert, the founding of a Chamber Orchestra and the repopulation of border villages. With the support of Chapters worldwide, the first rebuilt village of Norashen is now home to 100 residents, the construction of the second village Pareshen is on track, and fundraising for the third village Jrakn is underway.

In its commitment to move forward with the evolution of the international Armenian community, AGBU Central Board was also faced with the most trying decision to discontinue the Melkonian Educational Institute. With increasing challenges in delivering education to an Armenian nation that continues to change demographically, economically and socially, AGBU has since reinforced its dedication to its mission and, in 2005, AGBU Central Board was pleased to announce plans to open a second high school in the Southern California area. Difficult decisions inspire growth and advancement, and as we cross into the

21st century, AGBU remains poised to uphold its legacy of service and pave the way with unparalleled foresight.

With over 70% of expenditures allocated to education and youth programs, the new generation is the leading beneficiary of AGBU's goodwill. As advocates for our ancient language, culture, history and religion, we must continue to develop innovative, cutting-edge programs that appeal to younger generations, reinforce their identity as proud Armenians, and build enduring links which unite them with our homeland. Each new generation inherits the responsibility for safekeeping the Armenian identity, and we must prepare them for the task ahead.

Please remember that AGBU needs your continued support, and the good we can achieve depends on you. We are proud to say that donor confidence is increasing every year, as evidenced by our growing endowments: 946 total endowments have been established at AGBU as of 2005, compared to 599 endowments as of 1995. Through your generous donations, you fulfill an indispensable role by ensuring AGBU programs are carried out for generations to come. Our numerous achievements would also not have been possible without our many partners in governmental, Church and civic organizations, as well the countless individual volunteers who share our passion to preserve the Armenian identity. Through cooperation and solidarity, I urge all organizations and individuals to join AGBU in this universal mission to embrace the opportunities that lie ahead.

As goodwill ambassadors to our society at large, we will show the world the power of the Armenian spirit and the positive results when Armenians work together as one.

#### Preparing Graduates to Lead Armenia's Future

n October 2004 and 2005, close to 300 graduates joined the ranks of alumni numbering almost 1,400 at the 13th and 14th Graduation Ceremonies of the American University of Armenia. The university's most recent achievements include the acquisition of the Vartkes & Hasmig Barsam Building, which complements AUA's regional and international student recruitment campaign through the provision of housing, and the groundbreaking for the construction of the new Paramaz Avedisian Building, which will include expanded educational and research facilities. Annually, about 400 students enroll in AUA's two-year program, earning Master's degrees in Business Management, Conservation and Environmental Science, Engineering, Law, Political Science and International Affairs, Public Health and Computer Science.

#### ARMENIAN PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA

**Delivers Two More Outstanding Seasons** 

The Armenian Philharmonic Orchestra galvanized Yerevan's cultural scene with an impressive array of weekly concerts during the 2004 and 2005 seasons. Traveling to Ankara in October 2004, APO, along with the State Academic Choir of Armenia, performed together for a sold-out audience of over 2,000 under the direction of Istanbul-born maestro Hovhannes Tchekidjian. The program was the first of its kind in Turkey's cultural capital. The APO's Chamber Orchestra was also invited to perform at Lebanon's Byblos Festival in July 2005. Highlights of APO, under the direction of APO Artistic Director and Principal Conductor, Eduard Topchjian, from 2005 included sold-out performances by the famous Italian baritone Renato Bruson and Canadian soprano Isabel Bayrakdarian.

Through representation offices in Yerevan and Stepanakert, the organization administers a vast array of educational, humanitarian and cultural programs that serve countless individuals.

#### NORK, ARAPKIR AND MALATYA CHILDREN'S CENTERS

**Educating a Generation of Talented Youth** 

Since 1993, the Arapkir, Malatya and Nork Children's Centers have provided after-school instruction to over 3,000 talented youth, ages 6-16, in art, computers, crafts, dance, gymnastics, history, languages and music, in addition to participating in weekly church services and Bible study courses, which are held in the adjoining chapels. In September 2004, two gymnasts from the Nork Center's Circus Group traveled to the Delphi Games in Moldova and returned home with a gold and silver medal. At an international chess competition in Tehran, Iran, that same month, the Arapkir Center's Chess Class won the gold medal. In addition, during the month of October in 2005, the Nork Children's Center toured eight cities in North America (featured on page 16).

#### SOUP KITCHENS

Lending a Helping Hand

AGBU's six Soup Kitchens in Yerevan, Sevan, Etchmiadzin and Hrazdan continue to provide a daily meal to over 1,200 pensioners and orphans. In addition, recipients often take home the ample portions to share with family members and friends, and volunteers deliver meals to those who are ill or housebound.

#### **ULTRASOUND CENTER**

A State-of-the-Art Medical Facility

Recognizing the need for Armenia's physicians to keep pace with Advances in modern medicine, an AGBU benefactor donated a CT Scan machine to the Ultrasound Center in 2005. Dr. Levon Nazarian, Professor of Radiology at Jefferson University Hospital in Philadelphia, established the Center at the Yerevan State Medical Institute in 2000 for both students and doctors, some of whom come from as far as China, India and Russia to receive instruction. Since then, the Center has trained some 50 medical personnel in the certificate program and more than 30 students in the internship program.

#### VASKENIAN SEMINARY

A Spiritual Oasis on Lake Sevan

The donor-sponsored dormitory of the Vaskenian Seminary on Lake Sevan was inaugurated in October 2004. The brand-new facility includes staff rooms, offices, library and living quarters for a hundred seminarians, and is part of the larger campus that provides religious education and training to clergy who go on to serve Armenian communities throughout the world.



# Karabakh



#### **STEPANAKERT**

**G** iven AGBU's extensive support of Karabakh's efforts to rebuild its economic, educational and cultural infrastructure, a new office in Stepanakert was the next step during 2004.

t the request of Karabakh President **A**rkady Ghoukassian. established the Karabakh Chamber Orchestra (KCO) in 2004 to encourage cultural life in the budding republic. While KCO's premier concert took place in Stepanakert in October 2004, after AGBU's 83rd General Assembly in Yerevan, it performed its first Yerevan concert in July 2005. In order to help local youth develop their talents, several of the 17 KCO musicians, 11 of whom relocated to Karabakh from Armenia, have begun teaching at the Stepanakert Music College and at music schools in Shushi and Lachin.

#### KARABAKH REPOPULATION PROJECT

Bringing Armenians Home


he Karabakh Repopulation Project continues to expand significantly in the Hadrut region with wholehearted support from worldwide Districts and Chapters, sharing AGBU's vision to repopulate the country's war-torn villages with tens of thousands of Armenians.


NORASHEN: In 2002, the France District spearheaded AGBU's first village in Karabakh and built 23 houses for 100 residents, including 32 school-aged children and 14 pre-schoolers. In May 2005, a medical center, made possible through the gifts of AGBU France donors, the Union of French Armenian Doctors (UMAF) and the financial support of the Karabakh government, opened in Norashen.

PARESHEN: Through the generous donations of members of the U.K. Armenian community and matching funds from AGBU London Trust, the London Chapter volunteered for the significant undertaking of a second village with Phase One underway. Karabakh authorities and the London Chapter have taken the joint responsibility of supplying water and electricity to Pareshen, and the local authorities will also build a road that will connect it to other villages and regions.

Jrakn: Fundraising began in 2005 for this third AGBU village, with \$100,000 already allocated and additional pledges promised from US members. The initial goal of ten houses will launch the village and bring more Armenians to the region.

The three AGBU villages will share Norashen's medical center, kindergarten and primary school, along with a secondary school, which was sponsored by the Southern California District and the Sydney Chapter.

preparing young Armenians in more than 37 countries for successful futures, AGBU's educational endeavors serve close to 7,000 students each year. Starting from the decades-old Scholarship Program, which awards grants and loans to highly qualified candidates, to the New York and Paris Summer Intern Programs, AGBU staunchly believes in the importance and value of education. In fact, counted among the organization's institutions are the two largest day schools outside of Armenia the Lazar Najarian-Calouste Gulbenkian School in Aleppo (Syria) and the Manoogian-Demirdjian School in Southern California (USA) with over 1,400 and 950 pupils respectively.

#### SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Well over 1,500 students from 29 countries (listed below) received grants and loans totaling over \$2,043,000 during 2004 and 2005 to pursue their collegiate studies, in fields ranging from medicine to the arts and from law to Armenian studies. Almost half of this sum was allocated to scholarships for graduate degree candidates at the American University of Armenia.

#### **RENOVATIONS & EXPANSIONS**

APRIL 2004—Over 300 community members gathered at the NUBARIAN-MANOOGIAN SCHOOL in Montevideo, Uruguay, for a ribbon-cutting ceremony of the expanded complex, which includes two kindergartens, five classrooms and the Sam Simonian Hall.

JUNE 2005—His Holiness, Karekin II, Catholicos of All Armenians, blessed and dedicated six classrooms and a teachers lounge in the MANOOGIAN-DEMIRDJIAN SCHOOL in Canoga Park, California, during a special ceremony to unveil the new facilities. 
MAY/JUNE 2005—Several and the local ZAROUKIAN SCHOOL celebrated the



Held under the auspices of the City of Buenos Aires and the Embassy of the Republic of Armenia, and organized by the local Chapter, this program united all Armenian cultural groups within South America for the first time, including AGBU's Argentina, Brazil and Uruguay Chapters. Utilizing web technology to maximize exposure of "Megaevento," a live Web broadcast, AGBU's first ever, took place with 1,000 viewers online.







## NORK CHILDREN'S CENTER TROUPE ATTRACTS 7,000 IN NORTH AMERICA

OCTOBER 2005—Taking the United States and Canada by storm, the AGBU Nork Children's Center Performing Arts Troupe launched their much-awaited North American debut. Charming sold-out audiences totaling over 7,000 in New York, Richmond (VA), Washington, D.C., Racine (WI), Chicago, Boston, Montréal and Toronto with their irresistible spirit and enthusiasm, the 52 talented youth, ages 10-19, completed a whirlwind one-month tour. The award-winning troupe - comprised of the Haykazounk Folk Ensemble, Narek Dance Ensemble, Nork Circus School and Vahagn Drum Ensemble - presented a remarkable repertoire of traditional Armenian and contemporary art forms, including song, dance, instrumental music, dramatic recitation and gymnastics. Joining AGBU in hosting this large-scale endeavor in honor of the 1600th Anniversary of the creation of the Armenian Alphabet were the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern) and the Diocese of the Armenian Church of Canada.

# Young Professionals

Responding to the lifestyle of young, career-oriented Armenians, the global network of Athirteen Young Professional (YP) Groups mobilizes ambitious volunteers dedicated to AGBU, who enrich the greater community through innovative events and programs. Whether mentoring college students, sponsoring cultural events or raising funds for AGBU programs, YPs inspire thousands of Armenians every year to get involved and stay involved.

#### **NEW BEGINNINGS**

Celebrating its 10-year anniversary in 2005, the worldwide YP network welcomed the establishment of new groups in Boston, Paris, Plovdiv, Sofia and Tehran, nearly doubling its number. In addition, the first YP Conference held outside of North America took place in July 2004 in conjunction with the XVII AGBU World Games in Bulgaria (see page 18), which, along with a special YP itinerary during the 2004 General Assembly in Armenia, provided an ideal opportunity for YPs to connect with their global peers.

#### FUNDRAISING HIGHLIGHTS

Benefiting the Young Professional Endowment Fund for the AGBU Children's Centers, the YOUNG PROFESSIONALS OF GREATER NEW YORK (YPGNY) sponsored its signature Armenian Christmas Reception & Silent Auction in January 2004 at the Mercedes Benz Showroom in Manhattan with over 150 supporters in attendance.

The YOUNG PROFESSIONALS OF NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (YPNC) hosted its Winter Gala Getaway Weekend, the largest YP event worldwide, in the heart of San Francisco during February 2004 and 2005, attracting 500 guests and adding funds to the YP Endowment.

Reaching out to students in the United States and Armenia, the YOUNG PROFESSIONALS OF LOS ANGELES (YPLA) fundraised to provide scholarships to participants of the New York Summer Intern Program and an allocation towards the American University of Armenia's Digital Library subscription.

All in all, the worldwide YP network raised over \$25,000 for a variety of AGBU programs during 2004 and 2005.

## **FOCUS**

Initiated in 2001 as a weekend event and organized entirely by a new generation of AGBU beneficiaries and members, FOCUS unites global young Armenian professionals to share their international perspectives and pay tribute to the programs that have positively impacted their lives. From July 14-17, 2005, close to 600 young Armenian professionals flew in from Belgium, Canada, England, France, Greece, Israel, Italy, Lebanon and Switzerland, in addition to over 20 U.S. cities, for the third biennial FOCUS in South Beach (Miami), Florida. With a program comprised of a networking evening featuring a panel discussion, a silent auction of art from the Children's Centers, and a sold-out Gala at the Mandarin Oriental Hotel, the event raised \$25,000 for the Scholarship Program through pre-event fundraising.

## Youth



#### SUMMER CAMPS

The Buenos Aires (Argentina) Chapter's **COLONIA DE VACACIONES** attracted hundreds of children from December to February with its annual day camp. Offering a host of indoor and outdoor facilities, the local Center's summer session united youngsters ages 3-12 for swimming, music lessons and a monthly camping trip.

The Plovdiv (Bulgaria) Chapter sponsored young children in the renowned village of Markovo for its weeklong **GREEN CAMP** in June 2005, offering Armenian language, culture and religion instruction, and other outdoor activities.

Initiated in 2003 by the Sofia (Bulgaria) Chapter, **CAMP UNGER** brought together children, ages 10-12, for an opportunity to meet Armenian peers and take a break from city life.

The France District's Camp, **COLONIE DE VACANCES**, established in 1979, had full capacity during its annual three-week sessions in July, attracting campers from all parts of France, in addition to other European countries, Russia and the United Arab Emirates.

Continuing its 37-year tradition, the Aleppo (Syria) District's **KESSAB CAMP** sponsored some 200 children, who would not otherwise have been able to attend, at the camp for two weeks each summer. In addition, well over a thousand AGBU youth flocked to the site for their annual camping sessions.

A combined 579 campers, including 60 new children, from Canada, France, Germany, Lebanon, Turkey and USA participated in **CAMP NUBAR** (New York, USA), AGBU's longest-running camp, during 2004 and 2005. Several new additions to the grounds, including an art barn, adult staff building and lounge, three tennis courts, two girls' cabins, girl counselors' cabin, and sailboats and tubes at the lake, ensure that Camp Nubar remains a state-of-the-art facility.

#### ATHLETICS

XVII AGBU World Games Held in Albena, Bulgaria with Over 350 Participants

For a full week in July 2004, 350 athletes, YPs and supporters from Argentina, Austria, Canada, Cyprus, Bulgaria, Egypt, France, Italy, Lebanon, Spain, Syria and the United States journeyed to the Black Sea

While gaining important skills and learning about good sportsmanship and leadership, AGBU's new generation also creates lifelong bonds and celebrates the Armenian spirit.

Additionally, the first overseas Young Professionals conference was held alongside competitions in basketball, football, volleyball, table tennis, tennis, badminton and swimming.

27<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> Annual South American Games Cordoba (2004 Host) - Buenos Aires (2005 Host)

With more than 650 combined spectators cheering in the stands, young athletes from Buenos Aires, Cordoba, Montevideo and São Paolo competed for first place in football, basketball, volleyball and backgammon during this annual South American tradition.

Canadian Regional Games Held in Toronto (May) & Montréal (October)

Continuing their annual tradition of inter-provincial games, Canada's youth groups came together in the spring and fall of each year for two weekends of friendly competitions in basketball. In addition, an ice hockey competition, Canada's national sport, premiered on the roster during the October 2005 tournament.

Capturing the Cyprus Futsal Association's victory for the fifth year in a row, the **NICOSIA CHAPTER'S ARARAT FUTSAL TEAM** became the national champion in both 2004 and 2005. Competing nationally and internationally since 1984, the team is ranked in the Union of European Football Associations (UEFA).

The **PARIS UNION SPORTIF NUBAR** basketball and volleyball teams, both male and female, traveled to Nice in 2005 to participate in the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Manouk Tournament, where the men's team placed first in basketball once again. Also in 2005, the sporting group reached out to new members by offering badminton, and the men's basketball team climbed the ranks in local divisions.

Exemplifying their great skill in basketball, the BEIRUT (LEBANON) AYA ANTRANIK GIRLS BASKETBALL TEAM won the national championship title for the third and fourth consecutive years in 2004 and 2005. In addition, the BEIRUT (LEBANON) AYA MEN'S TABLE TENNIS TEAM proved victorious by also winning the Lebanese championship title in 2005.

Traveling to Damascus for the Syrian national swimming competitions in mid-July 2004, eleven members of the **ALEPPO AYA GIRLS SWIMMING TEAM** participated in a range of races, including 50-meter backstroke, 200-meter butterfly, and 400-meter freestyle, and came home with 16 gold medals, 18 silver medals and 17 bronze medals.

#### YOUTH GROUP ACTIVITIES

Recognizing the need to perpetuate the Armenian identity in Argentina beyond the capital and Cordoba, the BUENOS AIRES (ARGENTINA) LIGA DE JÓVENES organized the first Interprovincial Visit to smaller Armenian communities. In February 2004, some 300 people witnessed the official establishment of the Armenian community of Posadas (1,000 km from the capital). In 2005, in addition to celebrating their group's 65th Anniversary, the local youth made another interprovincial visit, this time to Rosario. Liga also mounted its immensely popular annual Woodstokian concert in 2004 and 2005, where hundreds of youth heard the sounds of emerging Armenian Argentinean bands.

## GENERATION NEXT MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

Modeled after the Big Brothers Big Sisters of America program, Generation Next Mentorship Program has been working with the Glendale Unified School District (GUSD) in greater Los Angeles since 1997. During the 2004-2005 academic year, the group continued to bring together more than 30 volunteer mentors and their assigned mentees at least twice a month for joint activities. The mentor relationship served as a role model for students, and offered them the guidance and tools necessary for success in all aspects of their lives.

In February 2005, the **TORONTO (CANADA) SPORTS & YOUTH COMMITTEE** sponsored a charity concert at the
Manoogian Cultural Center, raising funds for its sports and youth
programs. Three Armenian Canadian bands performed for over
175 fans.

During the month of August 2005, over a dozen French Armenian teenagers, ages 15-18, had the opportunity to visit AGBU projects and witness firsthand the positive outcome of the organization's homeland endeavors through the FRANCE DIS-TRICT'S ANNUAL YOUTH TRIP TO ARMENIA AND KARABAKH. More importantly, they also traveled to Norashen in Karabakh, where they helped build a nursery and forged friendships with local youth. Back in France, the PARIS UGAB **JEUNES** youth group brought together over 70 participants from England, Italy, Switzerland and all corners of the French republic for "WEJ 2005" (Weekend Jeunes/Youth Weekend). The event provided an ideal backdrop not only for an exchange of ideas among AGBU's European youth, but also to launch an enhanced level of cooperation among its youth groups. Further south, in the Provence region, young members of the VALENCE CHAPTER, who are alumni of Colonie de Vacances, initiated a new UGAB JEUNES group in 2005 that organizes weekly theatrical exercises, sports, cultural, and recreational activities.

During the month of September 2005, members of the **BEIRUT AYA DANCE GROUP** traveled to Armenia to reconnect with the homeland. The highlight of the trip was visiting the Nork Children's Center, where they met with the dance students and spent an afternoon choreographing a dance together.

Demonstrating their graceful talent, KAMISHLI (SYRIA) CHAPTER'S AKHTAMAR DANCE GROUP, comprised entirely of local youth, placed third in a Syrian dance competition in 2005.

During the months of September and October 2004, **SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA DISTRICT'S (USA) ARDAVAZT JUNIORS THEATER GROUP** staged five original one-act plays for eight evenings to capacity audiences totaling well over 2,200. To accommodate the demand, extra seats were often added, and three additional performances were staged after the production's close.

# Publications & Media

The organization's 14 publications spread the word to some 100,000 individuals globally, from local newsletters to AGBU News Magazine, which is published through the New York Central Office and has the largest circulation of any Armenian periodical in the world.

During 2004 and 2005, newsletters were created in Beirut (YP Corner), Damascus (Yeram) and Marseilles (UGAB Méditerranée), a new scholarly publication emerged from the Nubarian Library in Paris (Revue Arménienne des Questions Contemporaines) and the Sydney Chapter sponsored two directories for its local community, The Almanac of Armenians in New South Wales and The Bilingual Community Guide.

AGBU.org continues to be the organization's premier source for online information, forms, photos and events for 10,000 monthly users.
